

Dave's love of gardening really came to the fore here in Beachmere when he finally had enough land to go mad... and go mad he did! While developing his own garden he also became involved with the Beachmere State School garden as a volunteer and then ran it for about 3 or 4 years thereafter. His passion for coast care and land care eventually led him to investigate a plant called Vetiver grass. His interest led him to start growing the plant as an internationally registered nurseryman. That interest has now morphed into a thriving small family business supplying Vetiver slips all over the country.

Dave had many projects on the go when his life was cut short. He was a keen cook, a gardener, creator of satirical comics, a practiser of Biangun stick tai chi (which he taught through U3A), was learning new musical instruments and re-learning the Bodrahn (Irish drum). Dave always lived life large. He was a big personality, with a big voice and endless interests. He progressed from his kickbike to an electric bike recently and could be seen zooming around Beachmere with his Biangun sticks hooked up at his back, going down to the beach to practice. He lived every day to the fullest and will be missed by us all.



There was always something about Mary that was special_ eccentric_ artistic... wise and intelligent. Her garden personified her whimsical, curious nature, her resilience and life energy. Her paintings portrayed her appreciation of people and places, and a gypsy soul shone from her eyes as she engaged in reminiscences of a long and varied life. We are privileged if, in our lifetime, we meet a Mary. They are rare and precious people, interesting and also interested in the world at large. Mary was born in 1925, and had lived through many pivotal moments in history, with an ability to recall those times with clarity, a deep appreciation of human nature and often wry, self-deprecating humour. She read books, avidly watched current affairs programmes, and loved a good conversation. Mary passed away peacefully not long after her 97th birthday, surrounded by her family. Her backyard lives on, and her smile lingers in the faces of her children. She will be missed by all who knew her.

'S COMMUNICATION **POLICY** OPPORTU ACCESS ATTITUDE CHOICE PARTNERSHIP

We continue our series of articles explaining the Seven Pillars of Inclusion and how they are a practical tool to help us with our goal of making Beachmere Community Garden inclusive to the whole community. Today's pillar is Policy.

Paperwork, everyone's favourite reason to being involved in a community garden! Many people believe paperwork's place is shredded and in the compost bin, but in reality, it is a vital part of ensuring inclusion can be an achievable goal in our gardens.

Policy documents not only define standards of behaviour, they set out the expectations of community gardens. Our expectation is providing an inclusive and welcoming garden space to the whole community. But does simply writing it down mean it will happen? Not necessarily, it is, however, a great starting point for the process.

"Good policy offers clear direction and guidelines for everyone involved... and will help to set realistic and consistent goals and objectives "- Play by the Rules website.

You cannot assume that everyone has the same understanding of inclusion. People of different age groups and backgrounds will have different opinions on behaviour that can affect inclusion. A harmless joke to one person may be offensive to another and result in their feeling of exclusion. This is why clear policies, understood and accepted by all are so important.

Reasons Policies are worth spending the time on:

- Provide a written commitment that all involved are to abide by.
- Proof to prospective members that inclusion is taken seriously by the community garden.
- Set out a framework for managing complaints.

It must be said that developing policies can be an arduous task when starting out, one that can all too easily be put in the "too hard" or "do tomorrow" basket. This unfortunately can lead to bigger issues impacting inclusion down the track. Luckily, there is no need to reinvent the wheel. Talking to other groups about their policies is an easy way to help develop one's own policies promoting inclusion. We have been fortunate to have received advice and examples of policies from Boonah Community Garden to help develop our own, And as we develop our own and learn more, we look forward to assisting other gardens who are just undertaking this process as well.




