The multi headed broccolini is such an upgrade to growing traditional broccoli varieties, especially up here in the warm sub-tropics. A sudden hot spell can cause the slow growing broccoli to bolt, however, the smaller heads of broccolini mean they are ready to harvest smaller heads of broccolini mean they are ready to harvest quicker, before this may happen. It's not all bad though, if this happens, bees absolutely love the mass of flowers that are produced by this family of plants. Broccolini tastes great in stir fries, roasted or sauteed with garlic and lemon - delicious!
